






My linguistic portrait









Irish, English and Spanish – Gaelscoil pupils sample new language

NEVER mind bi-lingual, Gaelscoil Bhun Cranncha has gone multilingual over recent weeks with more than 60 pupils from third to sixth class taking Spanish lessons.

The school was one of 500 primary schools across the country to take part in the new 'Primary Language Sampler' from Language Connect that introduced pupils aged from nine to 13 to Spanish through tuition provided by teacher Aisling Walls.

"With so many languages being used now in our local community, this module really helps to build awareness and celebrate the diversity within the school and community," Úna Ní Mhaoildeirg Uí Cheallaigh, principal of Gaelscoil Bhun Cranncha explained.

'Say Yes to Languages' extended for 2022/23

The 'Say Yes to Languages' Primary Sampler Module will be extended for a further year and schools are now invited to apply for funding.

The module facilitates participating primary schools to introduce a Modern Foreign Language or Irish Sign Language (ISL) to their third to sixth class pupils.

The duration of the module will be extended from six to eight weeks for 2022/23. The lessons can take place for up to one hour a week, within the normal timetable.
