

**Niall** is Programme Manager (acting) for Global Village, the strategic partnership for Global Citizenship Education in primary schools in Ireland, between Irish Aid at the Department of Foreign Affairs and a consortium of four partners: DCU, INTO, IPPN and Trócaire. Niall holds a B.Ed. (Primary teaching) from Mary Immaculate College, a postgraduate diploma in school leadership (PDSL) and an M.Ed. (School Leadership) from the University of Limerick. Niall worked as a primary teacher in Ireland for 10 years and then as Primary Development Education Officer with Trocaire for 2 years. In his current role with Global Village, Niall manages programmes to support primary school teachers and leaders with their Global Citizenship Education practice.

Mary is Development Education Programme Manager with Trócaire. Trócaire is one of the four partners in the Global Village consortium. Mary holds a BA from TCD and an MSC in International Development from UCD. She has worked in international development for over 10 years, particularly in the area of public engagement and education. Mary has worked with Trócaire for 8 years and with the development education team in Trócaire for 3 years. Her role involves managing programmes to support children and young people to critically engage with global justice issues. These programmes include resource development, innovative programmes on games-based learning and documentary film making, and pre-service and in-service teacher training for educators in both Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland.

**Donna** is an Education Officer for Primary Developments with the National Council for Curriculum and Assessment (NCCA). Prior to joining NCCA, Donna worked as a primary teacher and was an Assistant Professor in Early Childhood Education at the Institute of Education, DCU. Donna also worked as a tutor for *Aistear: the Early Childhood Curriculum Framework*. She holds a Post Graduate Diploma in Educational Leadership and a Master of Education in Early Childhood Education. As part of her PostGrad Diploma, Donna explored Junior and Senior Infant teachers' attitudes and practices towards play. More recently, her M.Ed. thesis examined the implementation of an emergent approach to teaching mathematics in Junior Infants.

Jacqueline recently retired as Director, Curriculum and Assessment with the National Council for Curriculum and Assessment. As Director, she led curriculum development projects in both early childhood and primary education, including the development of the recently published Primary Mathematics Curriculum (DoE, 2023). Previously, she was a lecturer in Initial Teacher Education and a primary teacher for over 20 years. Her PhD research focused on teachers' beliefs about play in infant classes.

# Maths Madness Creativity and Mathematics: Story in the mathematics classroom

The new Primary Mathematics Curriculum embraces playfulness, creativity and collaboration with opportunities to apply numeracy in a real-life context that empowers children. This workshop provides insights and examples that will support teachers as they apply the new curriculum in their classrooms.

In this workshop we will explore the importance of story as an approach to learning mathematics, and will look at the research, practice and resources available on teaching maths through stories. We will share the experience in St Philomena's NS Tullamore where 6th class students published a collection of short stories called Maths Madness earlier this year. Participants will have an opportunity to experience the creative approaches used by Fighting Words in the classroom to generate maths stories with students.
